Greg Kinal will present his program which deals with the trials and tribulations our early immigrant ancestors faced in the decision to cross the Atlantic and come to America. The program begins with the reasons why our ancestors decided to leave Europe. Then comes the difficult task of paying for the voyage over. My grandmother's poor family had to borrow what they could to send her 18-year-old self here.

Next, how emotional was it to leave your village and all that you knew including language, dress, food, and religion. Our immigrant relatives had to be scared, excited and sick all at once. Most came from small villages located deep in their ancestral country. What was the city like where they picked up their ship? My grandmother came from a village of 400 and then came to Antwerp. Then the voyage over, with seasickness prevalent throughout the entire voyage.

Once they landed in NY, now what. Then came the hell of Ellis Island and judgements around every corner as this program will discuss. Once through Ellis Island, they moved into tenements in large cities like NYC. The neighborhoods were sometimes organized by nationalities. My family lived in South Buffalo. We were Ukrainian/ Polish and lived on one side of the street with the Irish on the other side.

The program discusses what jobs they took, and what the immigrant family was like here in the US. To give you a hint, I was very aware of my grandfather's belt that was passed down from my father to me. As we come to the last part of the program, emphasis is put on how important it is to us that they made the sacrifice to journey here. I will discuss the very emotional impact of immigrants on us today.


