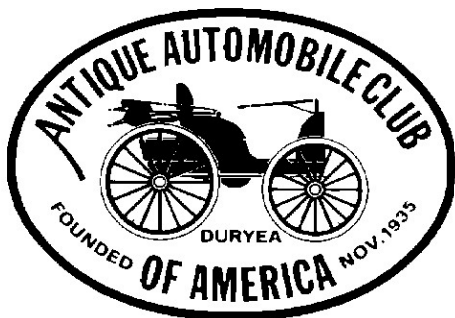

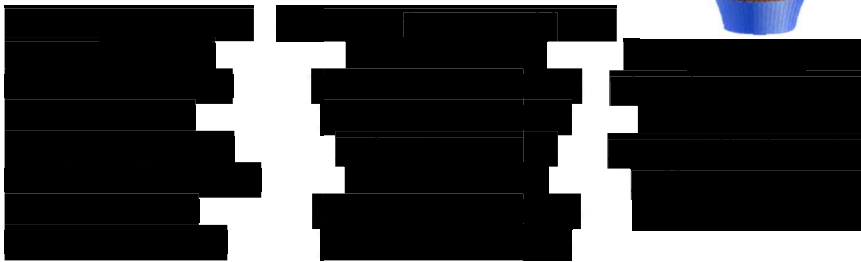

Cheese Cake Cookies from Chuck & Gertrude Wolski

1/3 cup butter	1 egg
1/4 cup sugar	1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/3 cup brown sugar	2 TBS milk
8 ounces cream cheese	1/2 tsp vanilla extract
1 cup flour	1 tsp lemon juice

Cream butter and brown sugar in bowl. Add flour and nuts. Mix to make crumb mixture (using pastry tool for making pie crust). Save 1 cup for topping. Press remaining mixture in 8" pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 min. Blend sugar and cream cheese. Add egg, milk, lemon juice and vanilla. Beat well. Spread over crust. Sprinkle with reserved crumb mixture. Bake 350 degrees for 25 min. Cool and cut into 1" squares.

Note: I usually double this recipe.

With the upcoming showing of the movie, THE NATURAL, Barb Noonan reminded me of a past article written by Bill & Marge Suggs as they experienced some time on set with their blue Packard which was a familiar sight at our many runs during the years that they were active LER members. I am reprinting it in their memory. – The Editor

THE 'NATURAL' EXPERIENCE CONTINUES...

If you've been following the newspaper write-ups about the 'Natural' you probably know more about it than we do, but here are a few comments that didn't make the news

Since the antique cars are our major concern, we thank all of you who have been involved for being so patient and understanding about the last minute changes. (After a day on location, we know that you are aware of why this happens...). The production crew have had the highest praises for all the "Antique Car Crowd" and your friendliness and cooperation have made them feel that this is a great place to make a movie...Thank you all sincerely,

As for the 'artificial aging' Fuller's Earth is NOT to make your car look old, but to eliminate any possible reflection which would ruin the filming. (Think of it as your contribution to a famous movie rather than having to wash your car afterwards...) Someone used a flash camera during one scene and the entire thing had to be reshot the next day...Also a lady in a vivid green hat walked across the street (accidentally) and brought a loud "cut and re-set" from the Director... Trucks and convertibles have been used sparingly and pulled out after one trip through a "take" as any distinctive car would be noticed on the second trip through the same take...A trip to wardrobe means that you come back resembling a photo of your mother or father from the old family album...A few of our drivers have lost their sideburns and a few lucky women have had "roaring '20's hair styles..

As we think back over the past month's scenes, here are some things that come to mind:

...Bob Limburg and Bill Kongessor that you are walking up the Church steps across from the Courier Express shot...Watch them tip their hats Marion Holman, a delightful octogenarian, driving her original 1930 Ford coupe says she, "Why buy a new car when this one runs perfectly and besides it's the easiest to find at the curb after a snow storm because it's the tallest lump..." Watch for her driving in downtown Buffalo-rain or shine...One group had the good luck to be at the Buffalo Psychiatric Center scene on Robert Redford's birthday...joined the singing and shared the cake. Robert Duvall and Kim Basinger were in this sequence and Morgan Fairchild was a frequent visitor to the set.

...An SOS call brought 5 cars to the stadium but they ended up on "stand-by", however we had a chance to see the inside of the stadium and watch the ball players practicing.

...the Chicago El was built at Main and Leroy for a scene called "Al's Diner"...Our good news was a last minute call for ten additional cars to report...This was the mass experience with Fuller's Earth and over-spray...(we hope you are all speaking to us again...) Chuck DiBella was our "Star for the Day" with front page coverage" in the News. You realize that his car was used in the film to hide a mailbox... and our Packard was the only thing big enough to hide Henry's Hamburgers...What price fame! Hats off to Loraine Todd and Virginia Rosa for handling their cars like veterans in the

background scenes... The hats they had were sporty 1939 styles. Ron Warmus pulled a fast fuel pump repair so that he never missed a turn...Many drivers held their breaths that day because it was extremely hot and the 'movie people' don't understand about vapor-locks, overheating, quick starts and sharp turns, but everyone came through with flying colors... Even Bill Suggs had his big day when they decided at the last minute to use Russ Hark's cab and Russ was out of town. Wardrobe rushed one of Redford's caps over to Bill and said "You are a taxi driver!" Redford helped his girlfriend, Glenn Close into the back seat and since the taxi made too much noise pulling away, three good-sized men crouched down and pushed it away. The laughter from the crowd was for Redford who had ducked out of camera sight and helped push the cab...

...Tri-Star Productions certainly can control the weather...a rainy night was created by sprinkler heads mounted on a long piece of PVC pipe and suspended 20' high and helped by a Fire Dept. pumper. This time it was Russ Hark's big night as he had to back out of the stadium ramp with Redford in the cab. Each time the rain was turned on as the cab came into sight...then Tom Lalomia and others drove by with the rain teeming down their windshields. One car was parked under the downpour and naturally the engine was soaked by 1 AM...Special effects came to the rescue with an air-drier and that ended the evening.

...The 1924 scene in South Dayton was delayed two days because of the Director's illness, but when the "Model T" drivers and guests arrived, a festive experience began. New friendships were quickly formed as people from Jamestown, Hamburg Gowanda, Albion and Buffalo shared the secrets of getting autographs, identifying the Stars, where to find the best spots for taking pictures and even how to predict the dinner menu...Bev Pierce brought her bike for personal transportation (occasionally borrowed by others) and even a baseball bat for the famous to autograph...Roger LaMonte used a baseball for signatures including Barbara Hershey...Oscar Doud had an Antique Car book signed by Redford...the hundreds of snapshots taken indicate that this '24 group will have a picture-sharing reunion very soon...Again we saw our precious "antiques" being used as props and to block off modern scenery...(Remember, the Movie does star Redford, not antique cars...) The carnival scene complete with pop bottles from the 20's, live goldfish in little bowls, shooting galleries, kewpie dolls, Ferris wheel and merry-go-round are but a memory...the steam train that puffed out clouds of black smoke is on its way back to Ohio...A most interesting four days. (The entire sequence of the Carnival scene will probably take a total of ten minutes in the final film,)

A new schedule is forthcoming and we hope there will be a few more car scenes scheduled by the time you read this...

ROUTE 66 ADVENTURES

Part 1- September 2024 – George Camann

Ruth and I recently explored Route 66 in Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas. On our trip we stayed in one of fifteen concrete teepees at the Wigwam Motel on



Route 66 in Holbrook, Arizona. The Wigwam Motel is originally known as Wigwam Village #6 when it opened in 1950 and is one of three remaining wigwam villages today. It



was the inspiration of the Cozy Cone Motel in Radiator Springs in the movie “Cars” in 2016. There are vintage cars parked near each wigwam; we had a green 1973 Ford Galaxie 500 near ours.



The next day we drove to Winslow, Arizona. That weekend happened to be the Standin’ On The Corner Festival. Our destination was the Standin’ On The Corner Park located on Route 66 in the heart of downtown Winslow. We wanted to see the bronze sculpture



entitled “Easy” dedicated in September 1999 of a young man resembling



Jackson Browne but represents “the troubadour” holding a guitar. On our way, Ruth wanted to stop at Earls Motor

Court, an iconic motel on Route 66 in Winslow to have her Route 66 Passport stamped. We met Troy, the owner of the



motel and he showed us his miniature bronze “Easy” statue. He said that Ron Adamson, the artist of the bronze statue is in town for the festival, and Ron is staying at his motel and was down on the Standin’ On The Corner Park taking photos. We parked and walked to the corner made famous by the Eagles song, “Take It Easy” (written by Jackson Browne and Glenn Frey). We met Ron, who lives in Montana, and he was kind enough to have our photo taken with him while we were standin’ on the corner. He was selling t-shirts, and we purchased his biographical book “The Road to Winslow” that was just published September 2024. We had an interesting conversation with him and when we mentioned that we were from Western New York, he recalled selling wood carvings at the Allentown Art Festival in the 1980’s. On the corner is a flatbed Ford permanently parked near the sculpture.

While staying in Arizona we traveled to Petrified



Forest National Park which includes a drive through the Painted Desert. Here is a photo of an abandoned 1932 Studebaker located in the park.

The views of Painted Desert are beyond description. We also visited the Meteor Crater Site and Museum; the photo of a circular sign is a speed limit sign on the road leading to the site where a large meteor struck Earth 50,000 years ago.



The other photo is of three Edsels we saw on Route 66 in Tucumcari, New Mexico. It is not too often when 1958, 1959 and 1960 Edsels are lined up together at an old gas station.

Legislative Affairs Info

ZEV (Zero Emission Vehicle) / ICE (Internal Combustion Engine) / Vehicle Choice

An update from last month: California's Ban on Motorhomes Mobilized SEMA's RV Counterparts. SEMA has consistently opposed California's zero-emissions vehicle mandates in all forms, including filing a lawsuit against CARB's Advanced Clean Fleet rules in October. SEMA has been talking to their counterparts in the RV Industrial Association (RVIA) about CARB's Advance Clean Trucks decision and how they may be able to work together to oppose these eventual Internal- combustion- engine bans. SEMA has led the effort to pass legislation and resolutions in nine states in the last 18 months that support governments remaining technology-neutral when it comes to carbon emissions and vehicle technology.

An update from Jan. and Apr.: Connecticut Gov. Ned Lamont said earlier this month that EV (electric vehicle) mandate was no longer under consideration for the state. Connecticut, as a CARB (California Air Resources Board) state, had sought--and failed-- to phase out all new sales of ICE (internal combustion engines by 2035, and was also adhering to current Biden Administration Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) rules, which say 56% of new cars must be electric by 2032. The Governor said "NO" when asked by reporters if EV mandates on the table.

ZEV: President-elect Trump has vowed to drop Federal EV Mandates on his 1st day in office. Sema has urged Trump to stay the course in response to a New York times report that, several of the nations largest auto makers have requested that President-elect Trump Keep the Biden-Harris Administration tailpipe policy that would eliminate consumers' vehicle choice by mandating electric vehicles.

Sema has applauded President-elect Trump nomination of Lee Zeldin as administrator of the EPA (Environmental Protective agency). Former Rep. Zeldin, as a

member of Congress and the bipartisan Climate Solution Caucus in the House of Representatives, sought to combat climate change while also protecting the nations' economic prosperity through constructive dialogue about climate change, economics, energy and conservation, He was a champion of one of the automotive aftermarket industry's previous legislative efforts to defend manufacturers, retailers and enthusiasts against the EPA overreach. His actions are reasonable and clear-headed in their approach to environmental issues.

U.S. House Members Request FTC (Federal Trade Commission) clarity to Ensure CARS (Combating Auto Retail Scams Trade Regulation Rule): This rule provides more transparency to the process of buying and leasing cars and to stop deceptive and unfair practices that harm consumers, including bait -and-switch tactics, hidden charges, and other conduct. However, while the rule makes it illegal for auto dealers to charge customers for ad-ons that don't provide a benefit, some dealers cite the CARS rule as a reason they can't continue to offer legitimate add-ons offered by members of SEMA's Professional Restylers Organization (PRO) Council. Reps. Posey (R-FL) and Bishop (D-GA) that request the FTC affirm that the rule does not prohibit dealerships from providing services that customers want, such as window tint that reduces ultraviolet (UV) rays, paint/underbody paint coating, replacing cloth with leather seat coverings, paint protection film that scientifically reduces clear coat damage from rock chips, truck lifts, wheel and tire replacements, truck accessories, Tonneau Covers, spray-in bed liners, and remote starts. Implementation of the CARS Rule is currently delayed as the FTC waits for the outcome of the lawsuit before the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals from the National Automobile Dealers Association.

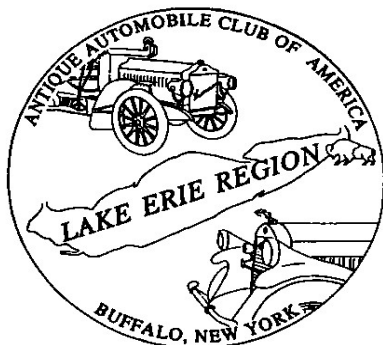
