Since we are once again asked to stay at home, here are a couple of favorite recipes from two of our members. Dinner and dessert, what a great combination.

<u>MIKE'S NY CHEESECAKE</u> from Mike Mesi White Chicken Chili from Linda Foster 2 large single skinless chicken breasts 2 packages graham crackers crush into crumbs 14 oz. can low sodium chicken broth or stock 1-1/2 sticks butter, melted 3 cans white beans (2 great northern and 1 garbanzo) (2 1 cup sugar cans undrained, 1 can drained) 2 pounds cream cheese 2 large eggs, lightly beaten 1 can white corn (drained) (or bag of frozen corn) I use 1 teaspoon vanilla extract vellow corn 3 stalks celery cut in slices 2 tablespoons corn starch 1 can condensed cream of chicken soup 1 cup sour cream 1 packet taco seasoning mix (or 1 1/2 packs if you like a stronger flavor) Preheat oven to 450 degrees. $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream In a bowl, mix graham cracker crumbs, butter and 2 tablespoons of sugar. Blend well. Press mixture onto OPTIONAL (which I add): bottom and sides of greased 9-inch spring form pan. Chill in freezer while preparing filling. 1 can diced tomatoes (drained) $\frac{1}{2}$ large onion chopped fine 2 large cloves garlic chopped fine

DIRECTIONS:

First, mix together the broth, soup and taco mix. Layer in crockpot: Celery, chicken, corn, beans, (taco seasoning, broth and soup). Cook in crock pot on low, for 8 hours. Just before servings, shred chicken breasts and stir in the $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream. Serves 8.

Can be served topped with sour cream, shopped green onions and Monterey jack cheese/or cheddar cheese.

In bowl, beat cream cheese and sugar until smooth. Beat in eggs, vanilla and corn starch until blended. Stir in sour cream. Pour mixture into prepared crust and bake 10 minutes. Use center rack. Reduce temperature to 200 degrees and bake 50

minutes. Turn off oven and

open door. Do not take out of oven. Leave in oven for about 3 hours or until

cooled.

NOTE: Can use parchment paper to line the bottom of pan to prevent sticking.

My first vehicle memories or What I learned from a 48 International Truck by Mark Kraus

When a person is asked what the first car is they recall, for some it's the car they learned to drive on, for others it may the first car they or a neighbor bought, all shiny and new. What a sight to behold.

For me, the memories start much earlier, I was probably about 4 years old. My dad owned a 1948 International KB-11, a three-quarter ton pickup truck with a home built stake bed, painted Hunter green. To start it you had to pull the choke button on the dash while at the same time press the starter button on the floor with your toe and at the same time pump the gas pedal with your heel - quite a ballet, especially if it sat for a while! Eventually it would start and you'd have to feather the choke until it ran smooth. After warming up, you'd have to put it into gear. The shift was on the column. That's where I learned about gears when dad explained to my older cousin Michael that the pattern was in the shape of an "H". We only knew about shifts on the floor. Eventually we got it.

We used that truck to haul everything. I remember pictures of when my parents were first married and how the truck was decorated for a parade - must have been in the mid-50s. But the truck did more than that. In the summer my dad did a lot of house painting and a variety of other remodeling jobs which is how I learned to tie half-hitch and full hitch knots to keep the ladders and load on. Probably the heaviest load was when more than a ton of stone was put on for use at a cabin he helped build in Franklinville. I learned about weight and stopping distance on that trip! But we made it without incident. Not that the truck didn't have its share of scars. There was a time when dad was turning left and someone drove into the back end of a fully loaded truck - you could still see where the other car's headlight hit the tailgate.

I don't really know how fast that truck would go though and I learned it sometimes needed coaxing to get up a hill. We owned a cabin on Burrows Road in Cowlesville where we'd go on weekends. To get there we would take Clinton Street from the East Side of Buffalo straight out. It was quicker than Broadway and had less traffic. In Elma there's bigger hill where dad would accelerate going down so he'd have enough momentum to make it up the other side. There were times I wondered if we would even make it! I can still hear that engine racing to go down and struggle to go up.

There weren't many creature comforts in the old truck. Just a two tone tan aftermarket electric heater with two doors to control the output in the passenger side foot well. It kept mom and me toasty coming back from the cabin on those fall evenings. No defroster, no radio. For entertainment we'd sing. Its where I learned the words to the Wabash Cannonball and other County and Western greats. The front window cranked out but we had it caulked shut so it wouldn't leak. It was a work vehicle after all.

It wasn't all fun and games either. I learned vehicle maintenance on the truck. The electrical system was 6 volts with the battery under the front seat. Replacement was pretty easy - just remove the seat cushion and lift it out using one of those braided battery carriers - most of maintenance we had to do was pretty straight forward - lots of room in the engine bay too. I also learned about "U" joints - what they were and how to replace them. Actually, it was pretty easy since the truck sat up so high. We'd also go to the cabin in the wintertime so we'd put snow tires on in the late fall. A bit tricky since the jack was a toothed-gear affair that worked but I was always leery. Over time we'd have them changed at Hardie's Friendly Service station on Bailey Ave the garage. There were no paper air filters either, just an inch or so of oil in the air filter housing to catch the dust and dirt. Eventually we had to replace the truck bed floor as it just got too many holes in it. I think we used two by six planks.


One year we entered the truck in a car show - boy that was a day, all washed and polished! I think it came in first place since there were no other trucks competing. That ribbon had a prominent place in our house for years. Still, not everyone liked the truck, especially for the annual inspection. Once dad had to take the truck to a garage where he didn't typically go, I think because the owner was on a well-earned vacation and the inspection was due. Well the new guy wasn't happy with a lot of things. For example, the rear reflectors were an inch too high - our argument was they rode at the right height when the truck was loaded. He didn't agree so dad removed the top screw and swung the reflector around - just right. He also didn't like the way the horns were mounted under the hood on the firewall said there was too much play, even though they were stock. So, we added a bracket from the horn to the engine block to hold them nice and tight. Probably the biggest change was having to add a 4-way flasher unit and larger brake lights in the back. Before that the signals on the front fender and in the rear were yellow, arrow-shaped lights in a round housing about three inches in diameter. They too may have been after market. I

always thought they were pretty cool.

Like everything else, the truck wore out. We couldn't get it to shift in reverse which made it hard to drive seeing that we parked facing in into the garage. We moved it to my brother's garage in Alden about 10 years or so ago and eventually sold it. Hopefully the new owner will be able to get it back on the road.

I miss that old truck but have lots of memories and learned a lot like family is important. Working hard and having fun should be balanced. So, what are your first car memories? Hope to read about them sometime soon.





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
