



She began to tell us that they had asked Bob this morning that he had two wishes today and asked him what he would

like to do. He said that he would like to take everyone out for ice cream and then go to the car show he had heard about at the town park and look for a 1956 Chevy.

I told the group that I would be more than happy to show them the inside of the car and answer any questions they had. Bob said that he wanted to see the interior and steering wheel of the car, so I opened the driver's side front door and pushed his wheel chair close to the car.

He put his left arm on the door arm rest and put his right hand on the steering wheel. He dropped something on the front floor mat and began to cry. They gave him a few minutes then pulled him away from the car. As I



picked up what he had dropped on the floor mat it turned out to be a very old and wrinkled black and white photograph of Bob standing next to a 1956 Chevy 4-door sedan that his father gave him when Bob turned 18. They took this picture of Bob next to our car, thanked us and continued through the show.

This past September, Olga and I drove our '56 to the show again. While we were sitting by our car a man came over to me with a picture. He asked if the car in the picture was my car. I said yes and then remembered Bob and the picture of his '56 Chevy. The person with the picture was an employee of Crossroads House in Batavia. He told us that Bob had passed away three

weeks after they took the picture of him next to our car.

We will now carry this picture of Bob in the front seat of our car so he can still ride and see "The U.S.A. In Your Chevrolet."

From Dean Burgstahler : Did you know?

The Goldberg Brothers - The Inventors of the automobile Air Conditioner Here's a little-known fact for automotive buffs, or just to dazzle your friends.

The four Goldberg brothers, Lowell, Norman, Hiram, and Maxwell, invented and developed the first automobile air-conditioner. On July 17, 1946, the temperature in Detroit was 97 degrees.

The four brothers walked into old man Henry Ford's office and sweet-talked his secretary into telling him that four gentlemen were there with the most exciting innovation in the auto industry since the electric starter. Henry was curious and invited them into his office.

They refused and instead asked that he come out to the parking lot to their car. They persuaded him to get into the car, which was about 130 degrees inside, turned on the air conditioner, and cooled the car off immediately.

From the "What the...?" File

The old man got very excited and invited them back to the office, where he offered them \$3 million for the patent. The brothers refused, saying they would settle for \$2 million, but they wanted the recognition by having a label, 'The Goldberg Air-Conditioner,' on the dashboard of each car in which it was installed.

Now old man Ford was more than just a little anti-Jewish, and there was no way he was going to put the Goldberg's name on two million Fords. They haggled back and forth for about two hours and finally agreed on \$4 million and that just their first names would be shown.

And so, to this day, all Ford air conditioners show -- Lo, Norm, Hi, and Max -- on the controls. Control yourself! Just forward it on. This is what happens when you're retired and have too much time on your hands.




