

George Nash turns 104

What's it like to look back over 104 years? Well, George Nash, who will turn that age on July 8th, shared some of his early memories. George remembers attending 2nd through 8th grade at the John Fiske School on 62nd and Engleside Avenue in Chicago. In 7th grade, he recalls standing at the top of the school stairs to ring a bell to start school. George was a patrol guard, sporting a head band and badge in the 8th grade. He had a busy corner to patrol that often caused him to be a few minutes late for his first class.

He had a neighbor in Chicago who was rebuilding the engine of a Model T Ford, and George joined him every chance he could to help take the engine apart. George's mother was concerned that George might be bothering the neighbor and went to visit him. The neighbor replied that George wasn't a bother at all but was actually essential in putting the engine back together because George knew where all the parts went. He was about 10 years old when this happened.

George and his family moved from Chicago to Albion, a small southern Illinois town, where he went to Albion High School from 9th to 12th grade. He played the French horn in the school marching band. Even as a young boy, George loved the automobile. He went to car dealerships to see the new line of cars each year and collected all the brochures, which he still may have. George's family grew their own vegetables, and they also had a cow and chickens. He had the job of cleaning the chicken coop, which he hated, and to this day he will not eat chicken! His family used the milk from the cow to churn butter, and eggs were taken to town and traded for groceries. On Sunday, he would go to church then to the

meat market to pick up a roast for 35 cents for the Sunday meal. George had a Mead Ranger bike to run his errands that eventually had 12K miles on it. George remembers 1929 when the stock market crashed. The bank in Albion closed in 1932 and paid 35 cents on the dollar. George's life savings dwindled from \$178 to \$63.

High school is where he met his future wife, Mary. In study hall one day, he was trying to get the attention of a female friend by throwing a wad of paper at her. With a bad aim, George hit Mary instead; she was none too happy and let him know it in no uncertain terms. Well just a year or two later, George was out with some friends who had a car. They offered to give some school friends a ride and George found himself with Mary on his lap. That was the beginning of a 70+ year romance

. George had several jobs before going off to college. During the summer of 1936, he worked at a Shell gas station full time – 7 days a week, 10 hours a day for 10 cents an hour. Gas was 13 cents (white gas with no ethanol), 15 cents (regular) and 18 cents (premium) a gallon. In addition to the routine gas station jobs, he worked on WPA gravel trucks greasing universal joints. George left that job in the fall of 1937, and moved on to working at the Albion Shale Brick Plant as an Assistant Payroll Clerk for 4 hours a day, 25 cents an hour.

George left Albion in 1937 to attend GMI – General Motors Institute in Flint, Michigan. He remembers the challenge of going home to visit Mary - he took a bus from Flint to Hammond, Indiana; from there he hitchhiked to Hoopstown, Illinois, and then took a bus to Albion, during 1940 and 1941 while he was attending college. George had saved money to help pay for his

college tuition of \$210 year to be made in 3 payments of 70. He worked in maintenance at the school for 50 cents an hour and his father helped with the rest.

George job-shared with a fellow student while studying at GMI. One of them would be in Buffalo while the other was in Flint during the school term. George was one of only four students selected to participate in this Tonawanda Chevy Plant program. The plant opened in April 1938 – a brand new building with new equipment. September 1938 was George's first week at Chevy, and he participated in the journeyman tool apprentice program thru 1941 starting at 60 cents an hour and working up to 95 cents by graduation. He learned to run each machine, making parts and understanding blueprints. George graduated from GMI in September 1941 with an Automotive Engineering degree and was assigned to the Tonawanda plant permanently. George helped in plant layout when staffing was short. He was a detail guy and eventually moved to aircraft engines Process Engineering in the 1st year. After eloping with Mary Leach in January 1940, they rented a 1 1/2 room apartment briefly in May/June on Delaware Street in the city of Tonawanda. The only thing they owned was a counsel radio phonograph. Before marriage, Mary worked in Illinois and continued after marriage until George was done with school and she was able to join him permanently in Buffalo.

Between September 1941 and 1942, Chevy Tonawanda participated in estimating production of antiaircraft shells, but lost the job to an Oldsmobile plant. At

the start of 1942, the Tonawanda plant cleared out all automotive machines except for the skilled trade, and the production of B24 bomber aircraft engines started. The company was tooling design from scratch. The engines were produced in 1943, 1944, and 1945. Also Bell Aerospace and Curtis Wright were "right behind us." Curtis Wright had two plants – one on Military Road and another opposite Chevy Plant 4. The pistons and rods were also made at the Chevy Buffalo plant. The production stopped the day the war was over. Plant 4 was an assembly plant, and all the government aircraft machinery was moved there. During this time, George received a draft notice. He took the Army physical, but due to some serious childhood injuries, was accepted with "limited service". The Army and Chevy plant management discussions over this resulted in George remaining at the plant to play his critical part in making the bomber engines.

During the war, the plant's automotive machinery was stored in a building on Sawyer Avenue while the aircraft engines were being made. The GM Flint group was taking some of the good machinery from Tonawanda during this time, and Tonawanda had to go out and buy new machinery when the war was over. Tonawanda had 8 to 10 good American machine manufacturers and was back building car engines in 1946.






